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

Board News

The Board held regular meetings on Monday, November 5, 2012 and on Monday, December 17, 2012. The next Board Meeting is scheduled for Monday, February 18, 2013. Full, approved minutes and reports are posted on our website, www.shearwatercondos.com.

Treasurer's Report-Linda Lawrence

A summary of our finances which is posted on the Shearwater web site every month shows how we are doing relative to our General Operating Budget for the fiscal year (July 1st – June 30th), as well as the amount spent and remaining in the Reserve Fund. The November 30, 2012 Budget Report indicates that our General Operating expenses are slightly below the budgeted amount by about 3% which is a good thing. The General Operating income is also about the same percentage below the budgeted amount though this will be corrected in January when the annual marina fees are received. In other words, so far so good in FY 2013!

There's also good news regarding the Replacement Reserve Fund which, for the first time in quite a while exceeds \$315,000. Other members of the Board will probably tell you that that's due to my continual nagging about approving unbudgeted expenses. Although true in part, we now have extremely good looking tennis courts thanks to the very professional resurfacing job by All Pro Courts – in addition to a newly installed bench on these courts thanks to the generous donations of three Shearwater owners. We have also contracted with an engineering firm (ETC, Inc.) which has recently submitted recommendations for deck replacements and a draft Request for Proposal to be used to solicit contractor bids based on these specifications. And now, to quote Phil Hatchard's report from a year ago: "the BOD is considering various ways to raise enough money to complete the balance of the [deck] work ... in order to put this project behind us."

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Marina—Eric Pettersen

On January 4, Skip Smith announced his resignation as co-dockmaster. He has served the community very well during his tenure and the association will miss his contributions. During the last two-plus years, he and Eric Petterson have made significant contributions to the community as co-dockmasters in their management of the marina facility. Eric will continue as the sole dockmaster at this time and will be meeting with the marina committee to decide upon future plans.

Currently the marina has seven available GCE slips, but zero kayak or dinghy spaces available. There are wait lists in place for both kayak and dinghy spaces, with two folks on the list waiting for a kayak space and six folks on the dinghy list. The dockmaster is still working to resolve the issue of size and/or weight restrictions on the dinghy floats in an equitable and fair manner to all involved.

The marina systems were winterized on schedule, with no issues discovered, other than the need to replace the water shut-off valves at several slips. There are no significant marina maintenance issues outstanding at this time. Future projects being explored include improving the kayak launching facility, as well as investigating the affordability of power washing and sealing of the docks every other year.

Landscape Committee—Ron Faulkner

The winter tree trimming is being scheduled and will take place soon. All other winter pruning has been done. The oyster shell paths have been tidied up, and plans are being worked on for new Spring planting. The Landscape Committee is pleased with the look of the grounds and we appreciate all the compliments we have received. We are still looking for a volunteer or two to help out, so if you are interested in working with the Landscape Committee, please let us know.

Important Reminders from your Board

It has come to our attention that some folks in Shearwater may be paying too much for Comcast cable. We would like to remind all residents that the condo fee pays for basic cable service through Comcast, so you should not be charged for basic service on your bill. If you have added Premium Channels, HiDef TV, or other services, you would pay for those services only. Please check your Comcast bill and if you are paying for basic service, call Comcast Customer Service.

<u>Attention Pet Owners</u>—Please be a responsible dog owner and *pick up* after your dog. Always walk you dog on a leash and carry extra bags. Please be a responsible cat owner and keep your cat inside your unit. Cats are not allowed to roam the property and use the landscaping as a litter box. Thank you!!!

What is your DOG trying to tell YOU

This time of year brings short, dark, cold days. Add some snow and freezing rain and you pretty much just want to stay inside by the fire. However, your dog has a different idea. He still has the need to smell, run, play, and work and when those activities slow down or even stop, your dog will find ways to get you engaged.

This time of year always brings cases to the behavioral center of owners going mad with their dog's "attention seeking behavior". Now all of us engage in some attention seeking behavior whether it is to be given hot soup when we do not feel good or to bark at our owners as if to say "hey, haven't talked with you for awhile, is everything still good?" Both are perfectly acceptable forms of communication when kept within reason. A stark contrast would be to demand that your spouse leave work to make you soup or your dog pawing and biting at your leg to be petted when you are engrossed in a conversation. Both behaviors can be tempered with a little planning and understanding.

When your dog gets bored from lack of exercise and stimulation they will quickly take matters into their own hands (paws) so to speak. But what you have to remember is that your dog will quickly learn what works and what does not work according to how you respond to their actions. If, because it is cold and you rather not go out to work with your dog, you give into behaviors that were once considered unreasonable, then you will get even more of the unwanted obnoxious behavior. Consider this example: It is a cold and rainy night, what would it hurt to allow your dog to come up on your new couch? "Just this once". I think we all know the answer to this one. Tomorrow, when the sun is out and a bit warmer, guess where your dog will be. You will tell him off, he will act out, and we are off to the land of bad behavior. Some dogs will start to look you right in the eye and bark continually, while some will steal things and swallow them to get that attention back. What we have done is used "positive reinforcement" to create unwanted attention seeking behavior. Even your reprimands are giving your dog the attention he got when you allowed him up on the couch.

Attention seeking behaviors can reach serious and clinical proportions but that is not the purpose of this discussion. We are talking about episodic behavioral changes brought on by seasonally reduced exercise and stimulation.

Common Types of Attention Seeking Behaviors

- *Barking more than usual or reactively barking at every noise they hear outside
- *Whining. Some dogs will just stand in the middle of the room and whine for no apparent reason.
- *Vomiting. This generally occurs when the dog is experiencing associated anxiety secondary to the attention seeking behavior.
- *Feigning Lameness. What better way to get you attention than faking injury
- *Chasing lights or shadows. We see this particularly in dogs that have experienced laser stimulation when they were Puppies
- *Snapping at "imaginary flies"

What do we do about it

The main principle behind treating attention seeking behavior is to ignore the behavior, remembering that any attention (negative or positive) will be rewarding the dog for said behavior. Now I know this is tough, and it will probably intensify before it gets better, but your dog will eventually lose interest and stop the behavior.

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We often use a "bridging stimulus" to hasten our results. A bridging stimulus is a signal or cue that announces a particular consequence. The actual stimulus could be a clicker, a piano key, or even a clap. The noise is used when the dog is engaging in the unwanted behavior, to signal that you are about to completely withdraw your attention, perhaps even leave the room. You must then follow up after issuing the cue. It must always signal the withdrawal of your attention or your dog will fail to make the association. What bridging stimulus does is focus your dog's attention on what is to follow as a result of his behavior, exactly the opposite of what he had planned. Attention behavior will mitigate more rapidly if a bridging stimulus is used rather than if just the withdrawal of your attention is employed on its own without such a signal.

There are many reasons why dogs develop attention seeking behaviors but we are focusing on seasonal changes that restrict activity and stimulation. So in addition to preventing the unwanted behaviors we have to ensure that our dog's lifestyle is meeting all their needs. Some suggestions:

*Is your dog getting enough exercise? A minimum is about 20-30 minutes of aerobic exercise per day. You may try speed walking with your dog to maximize the 20 minute walk.

*Is your dog eating a sensible diet? Do not feed your dog high performance food if his activity has decreased for the winter. Talk with your attending veterinarian before changing your dog's food.

*Is your level of communication with your dog adequate? You should be reviewing your Foundation Obedience work a few times per week. Try keeping your dog's attention on you for increasing amounts of time. Aim for about an 80% obedience compliance rate.

*Is your dog being rewarded with your attention, petting, praise, whatever, by doing something that you like? If not readjust your strategy.

Does your dog have a job? If not try to develop breed specific activities. Examples: You could hide treats so that hunting dogs could "hunt" them down. Small terrier type dogs can chase a toy or ball into a box as if it were a rodent in a hole. A working breed dog could enjoy a rousing game of hide and seek in the house.

Conclusion

Dogs that display attention seeking behaviors are generally needy and sensitive individuals and are probably in some emotional conflict. Quite often just ignoring the behavior and filling the time with stimulating and tiring activity is enough to get your dog to relax and await the coming of SPRING.

As you can tell, we only had 8 voting condos. Any ideas as to how to increase the participation for next year would be appreciated.




