#### **Board News**

There were Board meetings on October 17, 2011 and December 19, 2011. The next Board meeting will be held on February 20, 2012 and the Annual Meeting on April 16, 2012. Following are updated Committee reports:

#### Treasurer's Report-Phil Hatchard

A monthly Treasurer's report giving the status of both the operating and reserve accounts relative to budget is posted on the Shearwater web site.

As of December 31, 2011 we are half way through the Shearwater 2012 fiscal year. The major reserve fund project undertaken in the first half of the year was painting our buildings along with siding repair and replacement. The work was done by Palmer Brothers, who by most accounts did a fine job. While this was a major expense from the reserve fund, the balance will recover over the rest of the of the fiscal year, since the only other project planned for the balance of the fiscal year is the replacement of building entrance and pool building awnings.

The next major project for Shearwater is the completion of the deck surface and storage closet door replacements. The approach taken four years ago was to accomplish the project by doing it little-by-little over a series of years in order to lessen the strain on our budgets. The work was started four years ago, and we are now less than half finished and falling behind. As was communicated in a letter dated December 6, 2011, the BOD is considering various ways to raise enough money to complete the balance of the work in one more contract, in order to put this project behind us.

Landscape work will continue this month with the winter pruning and continuation of removal of old, unattractive plantings. The Committee is working on several projects which will be completed in the spring. We would like to thank you for the positive comments and the suggestions; keep them coming! With everyone's cooperation we can keep Shearwater a great place to live, and where we can enjoy our beautiful setting on the water.

We are still looking for a Committee member who will take the lead concerning the care of the trees on our property. ### Important Information from your Board

- A reminder— If you have a <u>true</u> emergency (i.e. water is flowing through the ceiling) when Brodie Management office is closed, there is a procedure to follow. The number to call is 410-377-1605. If you cannot remember this number, just call the regular Brodie number, 410-571-1400, and you will be directed to the emergency number. You will also find this information on the website. Brodie Management office hours are 9am-5pm, Monday-Friday.
- The recent building painting is now complete. Please call Brodie Management, 410-571-1400, if you see any issues such as paint bubbling, or if you were not at home when the doors were painted and want the 1/4" strip around your door painted. Please call as soon as you see any problem with our paint job.
- In 7 years, we will again be facing painting and siding repair on all of our buildings. It has been suggested that we investigate replacing the siding with Hardi Plank. Because this would be a very costly project, an assessment would be necessary. It would be necessary that a committee be formed to look into the costs for such a project so that we can be prepared for it prior to the next painting cycle. Please volunteer to head and/or serve on this committee. Please contact any Board Member if you are interested in working on this project.
- It has been suggested that two new committees be formed. The Quality Control Committee would oversee the work done on our buildings in conjunction with Brodie Management. The Nominating Committee would seek out potential candidates to serve as Board Members. If you are interested in doing your part to help keep Shearwater the best place to live on Spa Creek, please volunteer to head and/or serve on one of these committee.
- Attention Pet Owners—Please be aware that by our rules and regulations, pets are never permitted in the pool area or on the tennis or racquetball courts.

#### Water Conservation

As many of you already know, we are facing a doubling of our water bill due to a huge rate hike by Anne Arundel County Department of Public Works. In an effort to keep our water bills as low as possible, the Landscape Committee had cut back on watering with the sprinkler system this past Fall and the sprinkler system has been shut down for the winter. The Landscape Committee is also looking into having a separate meter for the sprinkler system so that we are not billed sewage rates on water used for irrigation. And, as happens every winter, the marina water is also shut off.

In addition, we can all consider the following measures to reduce our collective water use in Shearwater. By cutting back on the amount of water we use by simply changing a few habits, we can reduce the amount of dollars used to pay for water. Remember, the water we use is billed through the Association. While we don't individually see or pay the water bill, it is included in our monthly association fee. It benefits us all if we conserve our water.

#### In General:

- Grab a wrench and fix that leaky faucet. It's simple, inexpensive, and you can save 140 gallons a week.
- Know where your master water shut-off valve is located. This could save water and prevent damage to your home.
- Make sure there are water-saving aerators on all of your faucets.
- Report broken pipes and leaking outdoor faucets to the property management.
- When you give your pet fresh water, don't throw the old water down the drain. Use it to water your houseplants.

#### In the Kitchen:


- · When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run while rinsing. Instead, rinse when all of the dishes have been scrubbed.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly and save gallons every time.
- Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap, then reuse it to water houseplants.
- Designate one glass for your drinking water each day or refill a water bottle to cut down on the number of glasses to wash.
- Don't use running water to thaw food. Defrost food in the refrigerator or microwave for water efficiency.
- Soak pots and pans instead of letting the water run while you scrape them clean.
- Install an instant water heater near your kitchen sink so you don't have to run the water while it heats up.
- If your dishwasher is new, set it to cut back on rinsing. Newer models clean more thoroughly than older ones.
- Run your dishwasher only when full. You can save up to 500 gallons a month.
- Re-use the water left over from cooked or steamed foods to start a scrumptious and nutritious soup.
- If you accidentally drop ice cubes when filling your glass from the freezer, put them in a houseplant instead of the sink.

#### In the Bathroom:

- Replace your showerheads with a water-efficient models and save up to 750 gallons of water per month.
- Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you'll save up to 150 gallons per month.
- Replace older toilets with models that use less water. Or, insert a displacement device in the tank of your older toilet.
- When running a bath, plug the tub before turning the water on, then adjust the temperature as the tub fills up.
- Turn off the water while brushing your teeth and save 25 gallons a month.
- Drop your tissue in the trash instead of flushing it and save water every time.
- Listen for dripping faucets and running toilets. Fixing a leak can save 300 gallons a month or more.
- Turn off the water while you wash your hair to save up to 150 gallons a month.
- Turn off the water while you shave and save up to 300 gallons a month.
- To save water and time, consider washing your face or brushing your teeth while in the shower.
- When you are washing your hands, don't let the water run while you lather.

#### In the Laundry:

- Run your clothes washer only when full. You can save up to 500 gallons a month.
- Consider buying a new clothes washer that offer cycle and load size adjustments. Match the water level to the size of the load.
