
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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Board News

The Annual Meeting of the Board was held on April 18, 2011. The next Board meeting will be held on Monday, June 20, 2011. Here are some highlights from the April 2011 meeting. Full minutes and reports are posted on our website, www.shearwatercondos.com.

Treasurer's Report-Phil Hatchard

Shearwater Treasurer's May 2011 Newsletter input.

The detailed Treasurer's statement can be viewed every month on our web site. As of 31 March, we are in sound financial condition with operating expenses in line with the budget and a reserve fund balance of \$237,889.

We are following the Miller-Dodson Reserve Account Study recommendations for planned repair and replacement of Shearwater property. Their recommendations can be found on our web site. The major accomplishment this year was the continuation of deck, railing, and closet door replacements.

The fiscal year 2012 budget was approved at the April meeting. Owners will receive notice of the 2012 fees, which start in July, at the beginning of June.

The Board approved a 10% increase in Condo Fees at the April meeting. This increase is necessary for a number of reasons, but before listing those reasons, please be aware that Phil and Heather (Brodie Management) spent hours going over every line of the budget and reduced expenses where possible. See our website for complete budget information. The 10% increase was based on the following:

- Bring annual reserve deposits up to recommendation of Miller-Dodson Study \$13,000 2.8%
- Replace funds in the reserve account used for Phase II of the sprinkler system (\$5K per year over 5 years)- \$5,000 1.1%
- Unplanned maintenance (not identified in M/D study), such as structural repairs, water main breaks, etc.-\$25,000 - 5.3%
- Painting fund (not included in M/D study) \$20,000 4.3%

These percentages total 13.5%, more than the 10% increase approved. We are still looking for ways to save money, while at the same time keeping the maintenance of our property at the quality we all expect.

With the arrival of warm weather, the Shearwater Marina is again a busy place with everyone getting their boats ready for the summer boating season. The marina is nearly full. Of the 33 GCE slips that are available for rental, we have only four that are not in use and many of the owned LCE slips are being utilized. Of the 32 kayak spaces and 13 dinghy float spaces, all of these are occupied.

We had finally managed to clear the kayak rack of wayward (un-registered) and unclaimed kayaks. However, two more have suddenly appeared. They, too will very soon be removed. We have been able to fulfill the wishes of EVERYONE.....

The dockmasters would like to remind everyone that due to the significant fire hazard of fuel storage, there should be no fuel storage in the marina except for the fuel stored on one's boat. Your cooperation is appreciated.

For those who have boating guests that might want to visit this summer, please contact the dockmaster to arrange for slip availability. The cost is only \$30 a day, and in addition each unit owner has two free days per month to use for their guests. We can't guarantee an available space (considering how full the marina is), but we will do our best to accommodate.

As always the dockmaters (Skip Smith and Eric Petterson) are available to answer questions or assist in any way that we can to make our marina a safe and fun place to be. So come on down and visit with your boating neighbors.

Sorely against Mr. Peeler's will, Mrs. Peeler insisted that the time had come when they should remove the family to the summer cottage. Accordingly, on Monday all preparations were complete. While travelling with peace in their hearts and enmity towards none, the five little Peelers who, childlike, had wandered some distance away from their parents, were suddenly whisked from sight by a machine somewhat resembling an aeroplane. It is said on good authority that Mrs. Peeler fainted from the shock, but that Mr. Peeler, valiant and determined, started out to investigate the disappearance of the children. Hardly had he left Mrs. Peeler's side when another of the machines that had ruthlessly swept away the children were sighted. He at once hurried back to his hysterical spouse with a daring that reminds one of the great heroes of old who bade defiance to the sea, the earth, the air and all things therein. Dear Shearwater Community:

As the recently appointed head of the Architecture Committee, of which I have been a member for several years, I am happy to have this opportunity to refresh both new and seasoned residents' awareness of the By-Laws regarding the exterior appearance of Shearwater, and to remind you of the process to follow if you plan to replace or alter anything which impacts that outside appearance.

Historically, one of the primary reasons people move to Shearwater is the appearance of the exterior – buildings and grounds – of the community. All 93 units help to make and maintain the attractiveness and symmetry of our property. This message is to let you know what is appropriate and how to go about requesting any change that affects the exterior view of the buildings.

All exterior buildings, including decks, walkways, windows, doors and window coverings must remain in conformance with their sister buildings. Requests to replace or alter anything that will impact the exterior must be approved by the Architectural Committee, the Board of Directors and Brodie Management. There is a form to be filled out which goes to Brodie, is passed on to the Architecture Committee for approval or disapproval, and is then approved or disapproved by the Shearwater Board.

Most requests are quickly processed and approved. However, there have been notable exceptions. Among them have been requests for netting or plexiglass so children or pets wouldn't fall off the decks, possibly injuring or killing themselves. The Architecture Committee denied those requests. Requests to put in doors with decorative glass, leading, grilles, have been denied as they do not align themselves with other doors throughout Shearwater. Painting decks, replacing decks, altering decks by removing rails, etc. to improve the view are requests that have also been denied.

The Architecture Committee regularly approves window replacements, door replacements, and has the approved colors and style that conform with what is already in place. We will gladly give you that information. We also have appropriate outside fan replacement criteria, blinds criteria and wood color for any repairs, as well as approved criteria for interior window coverings, which are seen from the outside.. Just when we on the Committee think we have all bases covered, a resident comes up with a new request which we have not previously considered! Just remember, if it shows on the outside and you want to change or replace it, it must go through the Architecture Committee.

During these summer months, please consider your neighbors and keep any entrance unit plants so they do not impede a clear path for people or any emergency crew that might unfortunately need to be called and get immediate access to Shearwater units.

Have a great, healthy summer and let the Committee know if you have any questions.
